Born on Six Nations and raised in Fort Erie, Ontario, Judith has been an active Anglican throughout her life. At St. Bartholomew's, Ottawa, she was a lay administrator and Church School Superintendent; she was Outreach Director, St. John's York Mills and Aboriginal Outreach Coordinator, Grace Church-on-the-Hill, Toronto. She is active in the Anglican Church in St. Andrews New Brunswick. Judith was past chair Public Witness for Ecological and Social Justice. She is currently a PWRDF board member where she chairs the Strategic Planning Committee; she chairs the Primate's Jubilee Commission and helps lead the Vision Keepers in overseeing the application of UNDRIP within the Church. Judith is also a board member of St. Stephen's University in New Brunswick, a small Christian university.

*Provide a brief biographical description of yourself (max. 150 words) with specific reference to experience, skill, abilities and gifts that you would bring to the work:*

Judith brings many years of experience in leadership positions in public, private and not-for-profit organizations with specializations in strategic planning, transformational change, governance, government relations and program management - as a former senior assistant deputy Minister, Agriculture and agri-food Canada and various other federal departments, as leader of central agency reform in the Ontario Cabinet Office, as a partner in a government relations firm, and as vice president of the Institute on Governance. Fields of work have included Indigenous affairs, environment, international relations, labour markets, youth development, etc. She has worked at the United Nations and in development work in Botswana and Iraq.

She serves on the board of the National Ballet School of Canada and has served on a number of boards including as chair of HIPPIY Canada (a pre-school learning organization) and current member of its Aboriginal advisory board, the Carleton

University board of governors, as advocacy coordinator, Federated Women's Institutes, and served on the Ontario Immigration Minister's Partnership Forum (an advisory body on non-profit social innovation), board of the Friends of the Canadian Museum of Civilization, and past Program Co-Chair, Governor General's Study Conference.

She was a political candidate federally and provincially.

Supporting and sustaining the Indigenous church, particularly non-stipendary clergy, active means for new discipleship to expand the Anglican Church's base, healthy and sustainable use of divestment resources over the next decade, continuing healing arising from residential schools, attracting youth and implementing changes to retain active youth engagement, and healing of division around the Marriage Canon are all important challenges facing the church. Support to the new Primate's as leadership shifts over the next months and years is essential to both continuity and change ahead.
